Carol Johnson moved to approve the consent agenda; Nicki Morelli-Mayer seconded. The vote was unanimous.

**E. PUBLIC COMMENTS\***

- A. Jocelyn Garcia - Student, Senior. Not comfortable going to school. Have three high risk people I come home to. And three other high risk siblings I won't be able to see if I have to come to school. I don't want to risk that. I'm wondering if there is an option.
- B. Jessica Hutchinson - Want to express support for Hybrid. I feel we have the strongest plan and we take that plan seriously. When I come to school they are very careful.
- C. Kathy Scribner - 1st Grade Teacher - Experiencing true joy in students who are coming to school. I have concerns about the virus, but I also have serious concerns about our students emotional health and the ability to provide education. The kids are doing really great with masking and social distance.
- D. Drew Liedtke - Dr. Larson - 1 percent of our total cases in the county have a Thorp address. None are children and none are in the recent history. We are at 294.6 per 100,000 in the last 20 days. I think kids have to be in school. There is no risk free plan. About half our cases are CWU students. We've had a total of 9 cases since Kittitas has returned to school. It has been in staff or students and there has been no secondary transmission. They were infected

out of school but did not bring it into the school. The protocols are really good, including in athletic practice. Moses Lake School District has over 4,000 students and staff and has had a little over a dozen cases. I will tell you if I feel like there is a problem in the school. That would be secondary transmission and large populations. There is always a risk and we should be careful about who we are spending time with.

- E. Angela Dyk, parent and office help. My son in 7th grade and frankly it's not going well. It's off to a slow start, he's having trouble motivating, he doesn't even really know his teachers. I think it's hard that kids don't get to be with these amazing teachers, the best the county has to offer. We have a great plan, we had over 80 kids in the building, they wore their masks. They are so happy to be in school. I think our kids deserve a chance.
- F. Kim Rivera - Parent of 11th, 9th, and kinder. Junior was doing running start, met today to come back to Thorp. relationships are so important. It's really hard for them to learn remotely and have success. I see the pain of remote in students, parents, and teachers. The leadership of the school from the top down are enforcing the protocols. The teachers are prepared to bring students back in a safe way. I think it's to everyone's benefit to bring the kids back in the Hybrid model.
- G. Becky Hill- Dr Larson are there any other counties in the state separating out the universality positive numbers from the general population positive cases? Dr. Larson - We have been working with CWU since the early days when a student returned from China. We know all the positive numbers. What's difficult to know is how many students are actually here. We think it's close to 9000. In discussions with state authorities we came up with a plan to separate those students from the population, that plan has worked as we haven't seen any drift into the community as a whole. They are starting a prevalence testing plan, testing them on a rotating basis. We are the only community that has its own university health officer. They are doing more testing and trying to get students to understand. I think our numbers are low enough, where students are working, if they have kids in school, working closely with schools
- A. Willette - I cannot unmute however I would like to share my opinion. I am a parent to a student and also a teacher at Thorp Schools. Although everything should come with hesitation, I am in full support of moving forward with hybrid. Practicing social distancing and healthy habits are important always. I personally believe that our kids need us almost more than ever, academically and socially. I trust our plan and I also trust Doctor Larson to do what he feels will keep us safest. I truly believe that our environment at school is almost safer health wise than the other places that children are spending their time right now. I care about everyone's health and concerns, I have the utmost respect for those who have hesitations, but I believe in class is best.
- B. Andrea - Kinder teacher - Of course being in the building is the best. I'm concerned that the plan says for us to not go to Hybrid A unless we are at under 75/100000. and we are three times that. They are doing well but kids are magnets for each other. I feel like it's so hands on there is no other way to teach them, for instance with scissors, coats, shoelaces, it puts us all at risk.
- C. Dr. Larson - One of the classes we had a case was a kindergarten. We had to quarantine the whole class because of that close work. The data on children K-5, despite the fact that they get it as often, they do not transmit it as often.

D. Jessica Hutchinson - I haven't always been comfortable with going back to school. I feel like at Thorp we have the opportunity to do this safely and in small numbers. We can take advantage of that. Their demeanor changes so much when they've been at home vs when they have been with me. We are struggling. We are struggling. My 7th grader already has some learning issues. I worry about next year and the year after if he's falling behind now. We are both doing our best, but we are struggling. And his mental health is important as well. I absolutely see the virus as an issue, but we are at a school that is taking it seriously.

E. Becky Hill - I appreciate the answer but you spoke on the yakima news within a week sharing that 1/3 of the CWU students that were positive were living on campus and 2/3 are living off campus. So how can we not say there is no drift as you said into the community? For this reason alone I believe these numbers should not be separated. If there were no separation of these numbers we would now today be over the 75% which is the recommendation you and others have recommended is no longer safe to be onsite.

Dr. Larson - I'm so appreciative of hearing from community members, There are two parts, of all of the cases at central so far, we have only had one case in the community that was linked to a central student. That's why there is no drift. I am concerned as central students do live at home etc. One student went to a party with a central student. They are the only person who has been affected. We have central students working in fast food, day cares, hospitals but no drift. They are all infecting their roommates wherever they are. We do offer all of them separate housing for isolation, most choose to stay where they are. Second, we are still over. Those are recommendations from the state. Region 7 has mitigating circumstances such as the small community, low level of cases, etc. We will not be less than 75 as long as CWU students are in the county. If we start getting community spread we will be concerned, however that is not happening. We should be concerned about our community numbers in general. I have cancelled my Thanksgiving plans, my Christmas plans. We have some community responsibility to keep kids in school.

Becky Hill - Additional comments regarding high rates. Dr. Larson - Look at the numbers at the Kittitas County Public Health site, not the state site. KVH does most of the covid testing, over 90%. None of those negatives go to the state. The state only gets the positive. The state had 23% positive, but our real positive is 7%. Our percent of tests per week, it's pretty good. We have access to testing for anyone who needs it. We are still a divided county like we are a divided country. We have folks who take it seriously and are masking, we have folks who don't and aren't masking, that's why our numbers are up. The 75 would be a number is you aren't taking into consideration masking, etc.

F. Molly Oracht - I am only a parent so I will not ask to unmute but would love to share. I have a kindergartner and am beyond blessed for my kiddo to be with Ms. Green. She has done a phenomenal job with what she has to work with. But I completely agree with you Dusty, we are struggling. I am 100% concerned with everyone's safety, but I am more concerned with my daughters mental health as well. She is very different the day she gets to go to school vs. the days that she is home. I also work full time as I know many other parents do too. I am lucky to be able to work from home but it does

pose many challenges with sharing internet bandwidth and technology. I feel the lasting impacts of social isolation that many of the kiddos are feeling will have long term effects as they grow into young adults. Thank you.

G. Lynn French - In the plan, the numbers have been deleted regarding cases per 100,000. Will there be new numbers assigned? What will trigger a move to a different phases

H. Drew Liedtke - It's hard to know if we're doing anything wrong or being reckless because if we're doing everything "right" by masking and distancing then nothing happens. When nothing happens, we're likely to become careless. When we get careless, cases rise. So far (fingers crossed) Thorp is okay. I attribute a lot of that success to the care our school is taking.

I. Kim Rivera - I now have 3-5 kids that require the internet for school..... it's not a recipe for success for all, though the school has helped tremendously as much as they can

J. Dr. Larson - It takes 2 students or staff that are epidemiologically linked to consider it an outbreak. If there were multiple pods that have outbreaks we would be talking about shutting down for 14 days and isolating those staff and students. I've made a lot of mistakes during this. It was my call to say we were ready to go to phase 3. We had low cases and support ready. We moved into phase 3, we let our guard down, went to parties, and spread occurred. I read every single case, every single day. Parents are the most important in the education of their kids, in protecting their kids from Covid, protecting teachers from covid

Cubilie - We are heading into the holiday season. Is it better to open before or after or is that a consideration.

Dr. Larson - The safest time is now. The riskiest time is two weeks after Thanksgiving, and the two weeks after Christmas. CWU will be conducting testing at the cost of 1 mil after the break and again at Spring break. A lot of this is encouraging the community to change their behaviour during Halloween, Christmas, Thanksgiving. I would expect some bumps but we don't know what that will look like. It's going to be important to educate parents on being safe during these holidays.

Johnson - The low, medium, and high sections have been crossed out. We are way above the 75. I wonder why that whole section was extracted from the report.

Perkins - We will address that when we go over the plan.

Johnson - Dr. Larson, do you feel we are safe enough to move to the next level?

Dr. Larson - I do. I am concerned about numbers but it's not just numbers. It's a combination of things. In both Kittitas and Ellensburg there have been cases at the start of Hybrid, but there hasn't been spread. The close working relationship with the

	<p>school superintendents and school nurses is making this work. We meet with each once a week. They are a committed group of professionals that are keeping us on track and safe. Central is taking this much more seriously than most universities. We have looked at the overall risk to students including the mental health of students, teachers, and parents. There is no situation that is risk free. I am very fortunate to be a full time health officer in a county of 50,000 which is a rarity. I am in contact with other health officers across the county and the state. And no one is saying we should put on the brakes. It's about how to get kids in classrooms.</p> <p>Johnson - We are balancing the possibility of risk and overall health. I don't think a school can do more than we have. I worry about the risk but I know we are doing a good job of mitigating. It's a struggle to readjust to new learning programs. I think these kids will be more self sufficient because they had to be. I wonder if it's better to continue with what we have been doing and wait and see what happens until after the holidays. There was a question about the dashboard and why those numbers were deleted. We replaced it with the statement from the Department of Health. We meet with Dr. Larson weekly. We follow his guidance and guidelines. There is no number. We work with the Health Department to use all metrics and disaggregate local conditions. We have eliminated Hybrid B. We have full open, hybrid, and online. When we clean this up it will make more sense with where we are at. He has worked with each school in our county to open up their schools. If you look at the actual calendar, I have us scheduled to stay in Hybrid through the third quarter.</li> </ol>

3. The next technical change is in the cleaning schedule. We added two new janitors. They will be online two weeks before hybrid and will adjust that schedule as we see necessary.
4. Anne Cubile - My question is in the 4th quarter, why plan for an open.
5. Perkins - We want to be prepared for it if we are able to open. That's why we look at this monthly. Let's say Dr. Larson for some reason in February says you should be going full open, we as a small district couldn't do that. We need the time to prepare. But it's possible we wouldn't go full open into next fall or further. What really would change or plan is the totality of what he sees in the Calendar
6. Nikki - Recess and lunch has not been updated
7. Perkins - The overwhelming majority of staff want Hybrid, the community is probably about 90%. We need time to staff up to take care of the kids and keep everyone safe. I'm confident we can do this

9. Carol - Half the kids will come in Monday and Tuesday and half will come in Thursday and Friday. Why you thought this way, and not Monday and Thursday
10. Perkins - We did a survey of the community and of staff. It was overwhelming what people wanted. Especially in the lower grades.
11. Carol - What does group A do on Thursday and Friday?
12. Perkins - Extended learning available through online access.
13. Carol - What is happening on Wednesday?
14. Perkins - That's another question parents have. In order to transition from Group A to Group B they need time to do that. Teachers have their PLCs in the afternoon, a few hours to get ready for their next day and possibly have an office hour time. We really need to protect that time for teachers.
15. Carol - What training have teachers had to do this?
16. Perkins - We paid them two days in the spring, a day in August, and they have an additional 8 hours they can use.
17. Carol - So the lessons they give them Monday, Tuesday...then the kids are working on that work on Thursday, Friday. Class sizes, thinking about smaller classes
18. Perkins - Most of our classes are about 8.
19. Nicki - For the secondary students, what does cleaning look like between classes?
20. Perkins - We have sanitizing wipes for kids to wipe down their areas after each class. It's more than the requirements but it's good.

22. Perkins - We don't have that many kids. The halls are divided with tiger prints to follow.
23. Carol - Are they all coming in through the gym?
